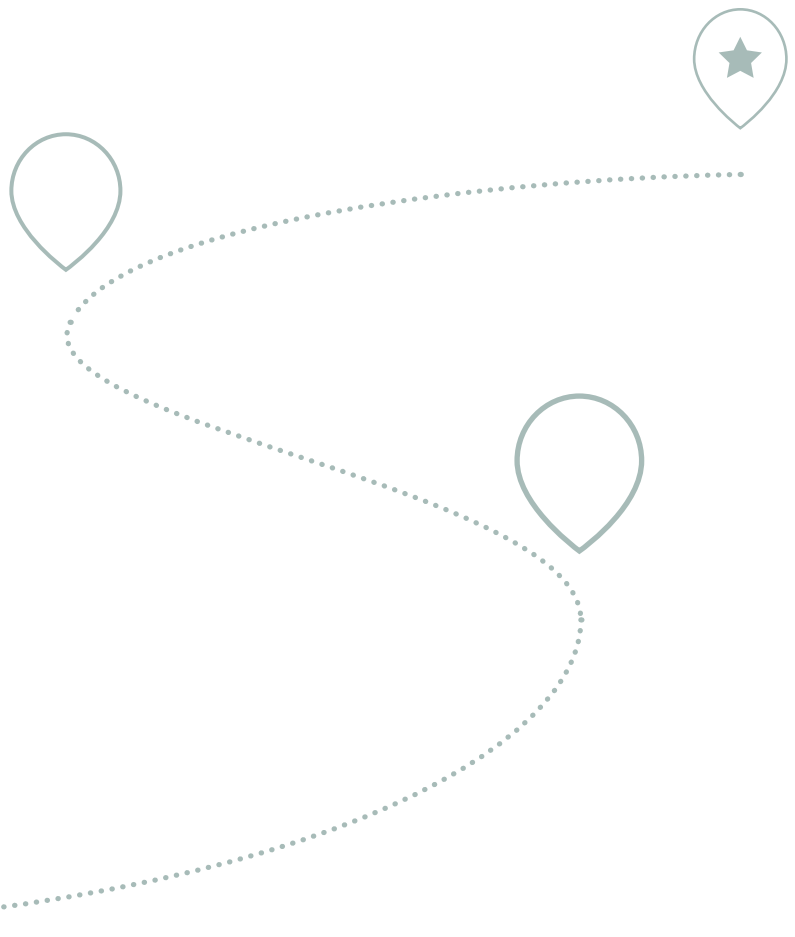

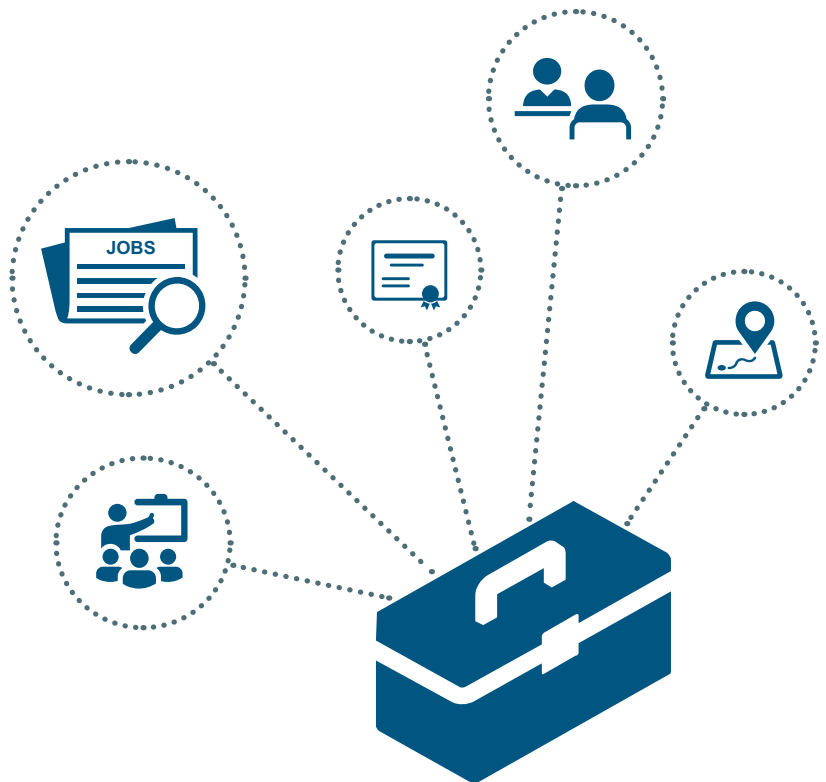

Frequently asked questions about the CareerCenter and the services we offer

What is the difference between a Maine JobLink account and a ReEmployME account?

Maine JobLink is where job-seekers can look for employment opportunities, post their resume, and/or find resources and information on employment services.

ReEmployME is where individuals apply for unemployment benefits. You will first need to file an initial and then file weekly claims to receive benefits. This is where you will enter your work search information as part of your weekly claims and upload requested documentation.

Both a Maine JobLink and a ReEmployME account are required to be eligible for unemployment benefits. The CareerCenter can help you set up both accounts.
